
A major decision was made by the Board of Directors during our annual recap meeting following the final round. The Board voted by a unanimous 9 to 1 vote in favor of changing the name of our organization from the United States Golfing Fellowship of Rotarians (USGFR) to the North American Golfing Fellowship of Rotarians (NAGFR).

It was also agreed that this change will not occur until after next year's tournament in Nashville. This change has created some controversy, primarily from past board members, but was supported by a large majority of the current board who felt:

1. North American Fellowship would be more consistent with the multi-national membership including the U.S. and Canada. 2. The new name would be consistent with the International character of Rotary. 3. The new name may open the door to more international participation in our tournament activities.

We are reminded that in spite of our differences of opinion the most important mission of our organization is "ROTARY FELLOWSHIP."

Set the dates aside now for Nashville on May 14-18, 2011. Jim Getchonis, Director for the Central Region promises comfortable weather, great golf courses and "World Famous Southern Hospitality in Nashville. Not to mention the area is steeped with early American historical sites and even some good old "Country Music." Make your plans now for a great venue and Rotary Fellowship at its best.

2011 Nashville Tennessee 22nd Annual USGFR Tournament May 14-18, 2011

The Golf: The tournament is played over 3 days (54 holes); a 2-day division with a break for touring is an option. Golfers are placed in divisions determined by handicap and gender. Stableford scoring is used, except for the lowest handicap players in Division I who compete on gross scores for the national championship.

Courses: Legends at Vanderbilt - Tucked between rolling hills and breathtaking panoramas, designed by Tom Kite and Bob Cupp and opened in 1992. www.legendsclub.com
